

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


As your second vice president, I am hopeful we can achieve greater success over this term in several areas, including:

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Biennial National FOP Conference









he FOP celebrated its 64th Biennial National Conference in New Orleans from August 12 to 15, with 4,187 registered delegates and 534 registered alternates, plus guests, family members and supporters, making it one of the bestattended Conferences to date. Members enjoyed the many colorful floats of Mardi Gras, sampled a taste of Louisiana cuisine and Cajun music, and tested their football skills at the Manning Experience in the Superdome, A special thank-you to the Louisiana State Lodge for showing everyone such a good time!

Several guest speakers, including Louisiana Lieutenant Governor William Nungesser. New Orleans Gry Manager. LaTonya Cantrell, U.S. Congressman from Louisiana Steve Scalise and U.S. Attorney General William Barr, addressed the delegation. The Expo was once again a huge success. with more than 130 vendors showcasing their products and services to the members. The President's Award was presented to Larry James and Jim Pasco. The outgoing National Trustees received plaques for their service and dedication to the organization: Jim Crowley (29 years). Duane Phillips (23 years), Joe Perkins (19 years), Gary Wallace (14 years), Dave Mutchler (5 years), Tori Beauchemin (4 years), Joseph Greenya (5 years), Danny Overly

(3 years), Steve Wolosin (3 years), Terry Fortenberry (2 years) and Jake Crowley (1 year), Cheryl Penoza received the Employee Award for her 20 years of service. Donations totaling \$2.832 were taken up for Easterseals, and \$11,154 was raised for Special Olympics. The Foundation held a silent auction and raffle, raising \$9,622.

Two amendments were brought to the business floor, with both of them passing. Five resolutions were submitted: four passed and one was tabled. The delegates of the 64th Biennial National Conference elected the following members to the Executive Board for the next two years:

2019 FOP MEMBER OF THE YEAR: PHIL WIGGINS

Phil Wiggins began his law enforcement. career with the Durham Police Department in 1969 and joined Durham County FOP Lodge #2 in 1971. In 1974, he left the police department to pursue his degree in religious education. The Southern Baptist Association certified him as an ordained minister and he went on to earn his Master of Religious Education degree. In 1983. Phil returned to the Durham Police Department as a public safety officer. He worked Uniform Patrol in District 1 and on a couple of street crimes units, being promoted to corporal. His next assignment was a Take Back the Streets initiative. A promotion to sergeant found him assigned to

Uniform Patrol in District 1 once again, and then to the Organized Crimes Division. In 1999, Phil was promoted to the rank of captain and was the executive officer first for the administrative major. then for the chief of police. His last assignment. was as commander of Uniform Patrol Support Services. Phil retired from the Durham Police. Department in 2003 at the rank of captain.

Phil was appointed Grand Lodge chaptain in 2009 and has been reappointed each term since. Since his appointment as National chaplain, he has attended each Grand Lodge Peace Officers' Memorial Service. Phil is also currently the elected chaplain for the North Carolina FOP State Lodge, having been re-elected continuously since 1994. In addition, he has been the elected chaptain for his local lodge since 1986, except for the years 1996-2000, when he was lodge president. He has participated in Durham County Lodge #2's annual Peace Officers Memorial Services for the past 33 years. During his law enforcement career and service to the Durham Police Department. he also served as the department chaplain.

Phil Wiggins is continuously performing services for law enforcement officers, members of the FOP and citizens within the community. He is committed to enhancing the spiritual and emotional well-being of our members, officers and anyone he knows or meets. AMENDMENT #1

The following proposed amendment is submitted by the Grand Lodge National Board of Trustoss, it was voted on and approved at the Spring National Board of Trustoss Meeting March 8th and 9th, 2019 in New Orleans, Louisians.

The National Frahemal Order of Police acknowledges the importance of individual memberahip in bargaining units in order to further enhance the pay benefits and working. conditions of law enforcement officers. Further, the National Fraternal Order of Police maintains its commitment to local and state todges to be the judge of its membership and establish requirements thereof.

Understanding the above, the Board of Directors of the National Fraternal Order of Police suggest and support the addition of section 7 below (tailes) to the National Constitution. All other language contained here is current.

The proposed change to the National Constitution is under Article 4, Membership.

CURRENTLY READS:

ARTICLE 4

Membership

Section 1. Any regularly appointed or elected and full-time law enforcement officer of the United States, any state or political subdivision thereof, or any agency may be elicible for membership in the Fratemul Order of Police, subject to the provisions. of this Constitution. No person shall be denied membership on account of race. religion, color, creed, sex, age or national origin. (Amended 8/17)

Section 2. Subject only to the provisions of this Constitution, each state and subordinate lodge shall be the judge of its membership. Each state and subordinate lodge shalf establish requirements for membership in good standing of its respective membership, which requirements shall not be inconsistent herewith.

Section 3. There shall be two (2) classes of membership: Active and Honorary.

A. Active Membership

- 1. Shall include regularly appointed or elected full-time law enforcement.
- 2. Shall include retired regularly appointed or elected law enforcement officers. who have remained in good standing with their state and subordinate lodges after retirement from their taw enforcement agency. In good standing shall mean a member who fulfilled all requirements of membership in good. standing in his respective subordinate and state lodges and for whom appropriate per capita tar has been paid to the Grand Lodge.
- 3. May include, subject to the approval of the state and subordinate lodges, regularly appointed or elected law enforcement officers who have resigned from their law enforcement duties and who have remained in good standing ARTICLE 23 with their state and subordinate lodges.
- 4. Only active members, as herein defined, shall have voice and vote. B. Honorary Membership shall be comprised of individuals recognized by the Grand Lodge, state lodge or subordinate lodges for exceptional service or contribution to the nation, the state, political subdivision, the law enforcement community or the Fraternal Order of Police. (Amended 8/15)

Section 4. No person shall be a member of more than one state or subordinale lodge at the same time nor shall any member who is delinquent, or who has been suspended by a state or subordinate lodge for any reason, be digible for membership in any other state or subordinate lodge until such suspension has been.

Section 5. The Fraternal Order of Police may dony memberahip to sewone who is: or has been, a member of the Communist party, or of any party regardless of what name known which advocates the abolition, destruction or violent overthrow of the government of the United States or any state or political subdivision thereof.

Section 6. The Fraternal Order of Police may deny any membership, or continuation of membership, to anyone convicted of a felony crime in any court of the United States, or any state court, once all appeals have been exhausted.

Section 7. The Fraternal Order of Police may deny membership to anyone who willfully chooses not to be a dues paying member in good standing of their bargaining unit. For this section to apply, the applicable state's constitution must contain similar permissive language.

AMENDMENT 12

The following proposed amendment is submitted by the Grand Lodge National Board of Trustees, it was voted on and approved at the Spring National Board of Trustees Meeting March Rth and 9th, 2019 in New Orlagns, Louisians,

There are presently three locations in the Constitution and By-Laws that require correspondence to be sent using "Registered Mall." These proposed amendments. would change the requirements to "Certified Mail." Registered mail is more expensive. and is gested more loward security of a valuable item or document. The intent of our mailing requirements is almost always to provide proof of delivery. Certified Mail provides tracking and with Return Receipt provides a signature of the person who received the mail. Most courts, lawyers, and government entities trust and use Certified Mail. These gmendments would bring our requirements in line with what common practice is and would exable the requirements to be met in a more economical way, still ensuring the integrity of the process. The amendments would simply replace the word registered with the word certified in three places.

The proposed change to the National Constitution is under Article 23, Discipline, Section 3. B. 1.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT:

Robert W. Fox

Editor's Note: It is my pleasure and honor, as your National screensy, so highlighs one of our browners or sixers in your Jossimal. This imageural Member Spudight features New Jersey State Lodge President Robers "Bob" Fax, a dynamic driving force behind our advancements as the national voice of law enforcement. I know that you will be as impressed as I am with Brosher Bob's accomplishments and his vision for the Order. — Jimmy Holderfield

ew Jersey's Fraternal Order of Police is guided by a visionary leader who has dedicated his life to law enforcement and improving the lives of citizens, both in his state and on the national level.

President Robert W. Fox has been an FOP member for 46 years. He started his law enforcement career in Cherry Hill. New Jersey, where he served 25 years. At the time, he was the youngest person hired on the Cherry Hill Township force. During his tenure, he served 20 years as an Executive Board member of Cherry Hill Lodge #28, including 14 years as its president.

In 1998, Fox got involved in the New Jersey State Lodge, which has more than 13,000 members. Since that time, he has maintained his service to the State FOP by serving on the Executive Board, and has been its oresident for the last five years.

He has accomplished many successes in his law enforcement career, but we will highlight some of those dearest to his heart.

Starting a Survivor's Fund

Fox was part of the group that started the NJ FOP Survivor's Fund to give survivors a \$2,500 benefit. In 1995, one of the FOP's belowed brothers, George T. Bowman, died in the line of duty at the age of 46. Bowman was president of Garden State Lodge #3 for 15 years and a 22-year vectern of the Pennsauken Police Department. He suffered a massive heart attack while pursuing and apprehending two juveniles, and remained in a coma for 53 days before passing away. After his tragic and untimely death, the Survivor's



Fund was renamed the George Bowman Survivor's Fund. In the wake of 9/11, the Fund was depleted to under \$1,000, and Fox pushed for statewide fundraising campaigns to rebuild the Fund. To date, it has comunitated over half a million dollars, and survivors receive a \$25,000 benefit.

Joining a Mission to Aid Children in Chernobyl

In 1999, Fox joined a life-changing mission sponsored by the Airport Police in Dublin, Ireland, traveling to Chernobyl in a truck caravan for 19 days. That international FOP lodge annually delivered supplies, medicine, water, food and furniture to abandoned children of the former Communist nations. At the time, Fox was chaplain of the New Jeriey State Lodge and trustee of the National FOP.

Pointing to a collage of photos of orphans he met during that mission, Fox acknowledges that most of the children have probably died from their radiation exposure. The mission changed his life forever.

Initiating the Creation of a Police/Fire Pension Board

New Jersey's public employee pension funds are totally underfunded and in disarray. Fox and other police and fire union leaders worked together for four years to carve out police and fireflighters from the other pension funds. Now, they control and manage their own pension fund, which is called the Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS). "By creating this new board, our police and firemen's pension fund will be secure into the future." Fox says.

While it may be debated in some circles, most will acknowledge the fact that Fox



actually kicked off this idea with the New Jersey Senate leadership, making his stateone of only a handful where police and firefiebters control their own pensions.

Enhancing 9/11 First Responders' Medical Disability and Death Benefits

It took over 18 years to get legislation passed and enacted into law that would enhance medical and disability benefits for 9/11 first responders. Under Fox's tenure, this bill moved through both houses and was signed into law by New Jessey Governor Phil Murphy in July 2019. Simultaneously, under Fox's tenure, a bill that simplified the process for first responders to recoup workers' compensation claims was passed and enacted into law.

Looking Forward

Among future goals for the State Lodge, For is ready to push for the New Jersey law enforcement community to have the right to carry firearms as authorized and aligned with federal law. Despite the fact that federal law H.R. 218 allows active and retired on- and off-duty law enforcement to carry throughout the country, New Jersey has placed several stipulations on police officers. These stipulations affect not only New Jersey police, but also out-of-state police who come to or through New Jersey.

President Fox says, "The NJ FOP will initiate a federal lawarit against the state if the Legislature doesn't amend existing statutes so that our police officers can enjoy the same rights in New Jersey as provided by H.R. 218 throughout the U.S."

He continues. "I am honored to have served as a leader in the local, State and National FOP I look forward to continuing my service with the support of my brothers and sisters in New Jersey and across the country." FOP

FOP-Backed Bills Signed; Promising Progress on Top Priorities



t this writing, the 116th Congress is just days away from its annual month-long recess. The National Legislative Office is proud to report that we have succeeded in passing another pair of bills, H.R. 1327, the Never Forget the Heroes: Permanent Authorization of the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund Act, and S. 998, the Supporting and Treating Officers in Crisis (STOIC) Act. Both bills were signed into law by the president.

In addition to these important levislative victories, we have made significant progress on our efforts to increase the co-sponsorship totals for our top legislative priorities - particularly with respect to the Social Security Fairness Act. Levislation repealing the so-called "Cadillac tax," H.R. 748, the Middle Class Health Benefits Tax Repeal Act, was also passed by the House just before the Amount recess.

Permanent Authorization of the 9/11 Victim Compensation Fund Is Now Law

The House took up consideration of H.R. 1327, the Never Forget the Heroes: Permanent Authorization of the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund Act, and passed it on a 402-12 vote. It was then transmitted to the Senate. which attempted to pass the bill by unanimous consent.

However, Senator Rand H. Paul (R-Kv.) went to the Senate floor and objected to the bill's consideration, citing his concern about the lone-term costs of the levislation, Senator Michael S. Lee (R-Urah) had also placed a "hold" on the bill while he worked to develop an amendment limiting the reauthorization. As a result, the Senate vote on the legislation was delayed a week. The two amendments offered by Paul and Lee were defeated and H.R. 1327 was then adopted on a 97-2 vote. with both senators voting against the bill. President Trump signed the bill into law.

lust the Facts:

Permanent authorization of the 9/11 Victim Compensation Fund and the STOIC Act have been signed into law. The U.S. House passed the repeal of the health care "Cadillac tax." Co-sponsorship is growing for FOP top priorities. including the Social Security Fairness Act, Law Enforcement Officers' Equity Act and Public Safety Employer-Employee Cooperation Act.

The legislation reauthorizes the Victim Compensation Fund (VCF) through fiscal year 2090, the same reauthorization Congress provided for the World Trade Center Health Program (WTCHP). Responders who were exposed to the toxins and chemicals released when the Twin Towers fell depend on those benefits - more than 75,000 responders are receiving medical monitoring or treatment for 9/11-related health conditions. Of those, nearly 8,500 have been diagnosed with one or more 9/11-related cancers. and 560 have died as a result of their response in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks. In fact, within law enforcement alone, the number of officers who have died of a 9/11-related health condition is now triple the 71 who fell on September 11, 2001. This number will only continue to rise, which is why the reauthorization of the VCF was such a high priority.

The FOP was very proud to have played a leading role in the passage of H.R. 1327. In addition, we also want our members to know the names of the 12 members of the House who voted against this legislation:

These 12 members of the House and Senators Paul and Lee voted against the VCF reauthorization bill and our members should remember them.

The Supporting and Treating Officers in Crisis (STOIC) Act Is Now Law

President Trump signed S. 998, the STOIC Act, into law. The legislation will revive and expand programs designed to help officers and their families with stress reduction. suicide prevention and the promotion of overall mental health and wellness. We lose more officers to suicide every year than we do in the line of duty. This legislation will do more to help the officers suffering from jobrelated stress and address the need for better mental resiliency and wellness for our officers and their families.

House Passes Repeal of the Health-Care "Cadillac Tax"

The U.S. House of Representatives considered and passed H.R. 748, the Middle Class Health Benefits Tax Repeal Act, under a suspension of the rules on a 419-6 vote.

The bill amends the Internal Revenue Code to repeal the excise tax on highcost employer-sponsored health coverage. There is a harmful provision in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA). also known as "Obamacare," which inflicts a 40% tax on plans exceeding \$10,200

for individuals and \$27,500 for families starting in 2022. This provision, known as the "Cadillac tax," is aimed at high-end or "excessive" health-care plans and would force employers to raise deductibles while reducing benefits. Law enforcement officers are compelled to carry more comprehensive and expensive plans due to the danserous nature of their work, meaning that the tax would have a disproportionately negative impact on officers and their families.

The House bill will now go to the Senate for further consideration.

Co-sponsorship for FOP Top Priorities Is Increasing

Social Security Fairness Act: This levislation, which has been a lonetime priority for the Fraternal Order of Police. would repeal the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and Government Pension Offset (GPO) in current Social Security law. We are pleased to report that the Senate bill, S. 521, now has 32 co-sponsors. At the close of the 115th Congress, we had only 27 co-sponsors, which is a significant increase - especially only five months into this Congress!

We can report similar success in the House

of Representatives. At the conclusion of the 115th Congress, we had 195 co-sponsors on the bill. At this writing, we have 192 on H.R. 141. With the change in control in the House, the FOP is focused on petting-218 co-sponsors, which is a majority of the U.S. House of Representatives. We need 26 more! As always, we urse all of our members to contact both of their senators and their representative and ask them to support this legislation or thank them for being co-sponsors.

Law Enforcement Officers' Equity Act: There are approximately 30,000 federal law enforcement officers classified as GS-0083 police officers who do not receive the enhanced "6(c)" retirement benefits that their colleagues in other agencies receive. Federal law enforcement officers employed by the Department of Defense, Department of Veterans Affairs. Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Postal Service, U.S. Mint. National Institutes of Health and many more receive lower pensions compared to other law enforcement officers with similar

The FOP has worked with our friends and allies to introduce H.R. 1195/S. 473, the Law Enforcement Officen' Equity Act, to expand

responsibilities. This is not fair.

the definition of a "law enforcement officer" for retirement benefits to include all GS-0083 officers. This would provide these officers with 6(c) retirement benefits and the ability to retire after 20 years of service at the age of 50, or after 25 years of service at any age.

In the House, the bill has 37 co-sponsors - significantly more than we had at this point in the 115th Congress, which ended with 51 co-sponsors on the bill. We are working to increase the number of co-sponsors in the Senate, which now stands at four.

Public Safety Employer-Employee Cooperation Act: This top priority has been re-introduced in the Senate by Tammy S. Baldwin (D-Wisc.) as S. 1394. Like the House bill, the leo-islation would require that states "substantially provide" for certain rights and responsibilities, including the right to form and join a labor organization and bansain collectively with a public safety employer.

The Federal Labor Relations Authority (FLRA) would be authorized to ensure that states comply with the provisions of the bill. and if they deem a state is not compliant, the FLRA may issue regulations governing the labor-management relationship between

public safety employers and employees.

The House bill currently has 141 cos-sponsors — which is already twice the number of our final total (58) at the end of the 115th Congress — and the Senate bill has 18 co-sponsors.

Action on Other Legislation

Extradition of cop-killers hiding in Coba Since the last issue of the fournal, the FOP has worked with our friends on Capitol Hill on a resolution, S. Res. 232, which calls for the immediate extradition or expulsion to the United States of convicted murderers Joanne Chesimard. Charles Hill, William Morales and more than 70 other fugitives from justice who are receiving safe haven in the Republic of Cuba.

The resolution, introduced by Senator Robert Menendez (D-N.J.), the ranking member on the Committee on Foreign Affairs, and Senator Marco A. Rubio (R-Fla.), also has a House companion, H. Res. 92, introduced by Representatives Peter T. King (R-N.Y.) and William J. Pascrell Jr. (D-N.J.). Both resolutions are pending in the House and Senate Committees on Foreign Affairs and we will be pushing for their consideration.

Corporation transparency and combating money laundering and Illicit finance: The House Committee on Financial Services considered and passed the FOP-supported H.R. 2513. the Corporation Transparency Act, on a bipartisan 43-16 vote. The legislation is intended to combat this misuse of U.S. shell corporations by requiring the U.S. Department of the Treasury, specifically the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN), to collect beneficial ownership information from corporations and limited liability companies formed under state laws. The bill is expected to be considered on the House floor at some point after the August recess.

Collection of date of law enforcement suicidess The FOP worked with staff in the offices of Representatives Michael B. Quigley (D-Ill.), Madeleine C. Dean (D-Pa.) and Gregory W. Steube (R-Fla.) to develop H.R. 3735, the Law Enforcement Suicide Data Collection Act. This legislation would establish a program to collect data on law enforcement and former law enforcement aucides at the local, state and federal level.

Every day in every community, officers put the themselves in harm's way to protect the public. However, these officers are not just at risk physically — the mental health challenges of police work are real and can result in depression, unbatance abuse, post-traumatic stress disorder, marital problems and, all too often, suicide. Law enforcement loses more officers to suicide than to line-of-duty deaths, but we have very little information about officer suicides and need this information to better help our officers in crisis.

Federal efforts, like the Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA) program administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBD), collect data on law enforcement officers who are killed, injured or assaulted in the line of duty and analyze this information to improve existing officer safety training protocols. A better understanding of the physical threats officers face when on duty leads to advancements in equipment and training to mitieate these risks.

The Law Enforcement Suicide
Data Collection Act follows this model
and would collect information on law
enforcement and former law enforcement
suicides and attempted suicides, using it
to improve existing suicide prevention
programs. We know that officers in crisis
need help, but we need more information
if we are to be successful in our efforts
to provide it. Unlike many line-of-duty
deaths, suicides are preventable, and we
must do a better job for our officers who
are struggling with their mental health
and wellness.

Using Social Media

As the voice of our nation's law enforcement officers, we must continuously adapt in order to make our voices heard. Social media is a very powerful way to do that, allowing the FOP to have intimate, personal conversations with hundreds, if not thousands, of members and potential members, supporters and opponents, the general public and elected officials. We urge all FOP lodges to capitalize on the opportunity to communicate with others via social media, at any time of the day or night, anywhere in the world.

Using social media to engage your local and state elected officials, as well as your elected representatives and senators in Congress, is a terrific way to ensure that

the issues important to law enforcement get their attention. Tools such as Facebook and Twitter should not be an afterthought. - lodges cannot just set up a Twitter account, publish one or two tweets and expect hundreds of members to start following them. When posting content, keep at it and be consistent with both activity and messaging. Make it part of a daily task or habit to post, share or like somethine. Each lodge must determine what that something is: What is your goal? Once you have a goal - it may relate to legislation, community activity or another area - it is important that you remember to stay on message.

The National Legislative Office's goal is to use social media platforms—primarily Twitter and Facebook — to reach our members and advocate for our legislative agenda by frequently posting press releases and updates on legislative activity as well as sharing events and news. Many members of the media and elected officials have interacted with us on Twitter, helping spread our announcements and positions.

The National Fraternal Order of Police Political Action Committee (NFOP PAC) plays an important role in the FOP's legislative advocacy strategy. The NFOP PAC allows the FOP to more effectively represent our members and advance our agenda on Capitol Hill. The FOP is the voice for law enforcement, so it is crucial we keep our PAC strong.

To do this, we are urging every FOP member in your lodge to make a donation and to consider becoming a monthly contribution. These contributions will help grow our PAC and amplify our voice in the legislative process. We also encourage lodges to consider participating in a payroll deduction program. Fatal Police Shootings Since 2015

ver the years, we have been challenged to compile the number of police shootings that have taken place throughout the United States.

The Washington Pass has compiled the number of fatal police shootings since 2015. The Department of Justice has recently budgeted to undertake the tracking of the same information. What we are able to eather from this information provides a different perspective. Many of the assumptions that have been reported in the media have not accurately reflected the data that is contained in The Washington Post.

This provides us with some factual information that is worth discussing and

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building upon. A summary of the data is provided below.

Summary of Data

- . The total number of annual fatal police shootings has generally been stable from year to year, the number of deaths each year has consistently been more than 950. As of July 15, 2019, there have been 4.421 fatal police shootines in the United States since 2015. Presently, 2019 has a below-average number of incidents. At the current rate. 2019 would be the least deadly year since 2015 if nothing changes.
- . Less than 10% of victims each year are unarmed. Most victims are armed with a deadly weapon or what appears to be a weapon (i.e., oun, toy oun, knife or vehicle). In 2015, 74% of victims were engaged in an attack on the officer when the shooting occurred.
- · Each year, around 95% of the victims are males. Around 44% of the victims are white, 23% are black and 17% are Hispanic. Among unarmed victims, 91% are male, 41% are white, 35% are black and 17% are Hispanic.
- · The age group that has been affected the

most by police shootings is that of persons ages 30-44, followed closely by ages 18-29, Combined, ages 18-44 account for around 65-70% of victims each year.

- · Approximately 23% of total victims suffered from, or appeared to suffer from, a mental illness. Mental illness is less prevalent amone unarmed victims.
- . More than 60% of victims were not fleeine and were shot while on the scene. Around 17% were shot while fleeing in a car, and about 13% were shot while fleeingon foot. Unarmed victims and unarmed black victims were more likely to attempt
- · In about 88% of the fatal police shootings, the officer either was not wearing a body carneta or the body carnera was not numed on
- · California has consistently had the highest number of fatal police shootings. New Mexico has the highest number of fatal police shootings per capita based on population count. Accounting for the uneven distribution of black Americans across states, the state of Idaho had the highest number of shootings of black victims per black residents, FOP


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
